#### **Independence Day**

Some of the most important words ever written are from the Declaration of Independence. "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." With this statement, America said it no longer wanted to part of the British Empire. Did you ever wonder what the story behind those words was?

When the Declaration was written, America had many problems. The colonies were frustrated with England, People living in the thirteen colonies were tired of paying taxes to the British government. They were mostly upset that they didn't even get to vote or have their own representatives in the British government to vote about these Exes. That's where the words "no taxation without representation" came from,

• The Colonists Protests became more serious in 1773. Colonists stormed onto a British ship docked in the Boston Harbor and threw boxes full of tea overboard. This was cost the Boston Top Party. In 1774, the British Parliament (government) paid back the colonists with the Opercive Acts. They wanted to make an example of Massachusetts. The Acts tried to take away Massachusetts' right to have their own government. It also closed Boston's port until Massachusetts paid for the tea that was thrown overboard during the Boston Tea Party. The colonists hated the Coercive Acts. These acts became known as the Intolerable Acts.

In 1774, leaders from the thirteen colonies had a meeting to figure out what to do. That meeting is known as the *First Confinental Congress*. At that meeting, those leaders decided to boycott, or stop buying, British goods. They also sent a letter to the king to try to get him to take back the Intolerable Acts. It didn't work. By 1775, the Revolutionary War began with the famous "shot heard 'round the world".

Many leaders in the colonies still hoped for peace. The king ignored a second letter from the colonists. Britain tried even harder to stop the Americans from fighting back. They even hired German soldiers to attack the colonies. It didn't work. Even more colonists now wanted independence and were ready to stand for their freedom.

In June of 1776, five young men got together to write a Declaration of Independence. They were John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, Robert R. Livingston, and Roger Sherman. The men decided that Jefferson should be the one to actually write the declaration. When the document was shared with Congress, everyone worked together to edit it. On July 2nd, Congress voted to become independent from Britain. Two days later the declaration was finished. The Declaration of Independence was published. That day, July 4th, 1776, became one of the most important dates in the history of the United States. Independence Day was born!

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
