



The United States began with just thirteen states. Now, though, it is made up of fifty states and sixteen territories. How did the United States grow so quickly? What were the driving forces behind its expansion? One reason is a concept that first

Manifest Destiny was a popular belief that America's destiny was to stretch from the Atlantic Ocean all the way to the Pacific Ocean. Part of the belief was that democracy ought to be spread to as many people as possible. Perhaps more importantly, though, the United States' westward expansion was driven by economic desire and need. People knew that if they headed west, they could find a place of their own to start a new life. Often, when immigrants landed on the East Coast, they would just keep on going west until they found what they were looking for, which was opportunity. That meant different things for different people. For example, some people went west to start farms, others went in search of gold and silver, and still

America's expansion westward didn't happen all at once, though. In order to technically control land, the United States either needed to purchase it or come into it by war or political pressure. The first big addition to the United States was called the Louisiana Purchase. Under President Thomas Jefferson's leadership, the United States purchased a gigantic piece of land from France. That purchase added the land where most of the plains states, like Nebraska, are situated. In 1819, President John Quincy Adams negotiated with Spain to add Florida to the United States.

In 1836, the Republic of Texas declared its independence from Mexico. It became part of the United States about ten years later. Just a few years later, the United States won the Mexican-American War. As a result, Mexico gave the United States the land that now makes up California and the other southwestern states. The next big addition was Alaska, which was purchased in 1867. It took a long time for it to become an official state, though. That didn't happen until 1959, almost one hundred

As the United States expanded its borders, people continued to journey westward. Some people made the trip with covered wagons, pulled by oxen. Others rode horses. Some families even pulled their belongings with them in heavy, wheeled containers called handcarts. The people who made this harrowing journey are called "pioneers." This trip took months and months. Sadly, many pioneers died on the way, but their sacrifice helped establish a network of trails that made the trip easier for future travelers. Thankfully, the First Transcontinental Railroad, the first railroad to go coast-to-coast, was finished in 1869. It made the trip much quicker and

2nd Reading: Teacher (or partner) r passage a second time while stud follow along. Have students comp Vocabulary. This allows students t understanding of unfamiliar word passage, leading to a deeper co the text.



3rd Reading: Students reread th then responds in writing, citing students complete Task 3: Rere This page of questions requires and cite text evidence when questions. Additionally, stude Task 4: Reread and Respond Summarize. These final tasks use the text evidence to writ and supported summary.

The more difficult passage has a lacktriangle in the bottom left corner.


Each passage with its activities is designed for a 5-day time frame, following this schedule:
